

- Don't be too friendly to people you don't know and distrust when others behave too friendly without cause.
- Don't let yourself be tempted by alluring sale offers or the three cards' game.
- Pay attention to your luggage; don't carry too much around.
- When walking on a sidewalk, carry bags and purses wall-side, not road-side, and don't carry around valuables, money or travelling tickets.
- Just carry around the amount of money that you reasonably need.
- Never carry valuables or money in your trousers' back pocket or in easily accessible bags.
- Do not wear expensive clothes or jewels that may draw robbers' attention.
- For money offers keep change in your pockets, do not take out your wallet.
- Mind people asking you for the time or change, they might be interested in your watch or wallet.
- If you feel shadowed by someone, enter a coffeehouse or an attended place and call emergency numbers 113 or 112.
- If you are being pickpocketed, leave your bag or purse to avoid being dragged; try to observe as much useful evidence as possible that may help identify the pickpocket or their car/moped and report to a police station.
- At an ATM counter stop operations if you feel observed.

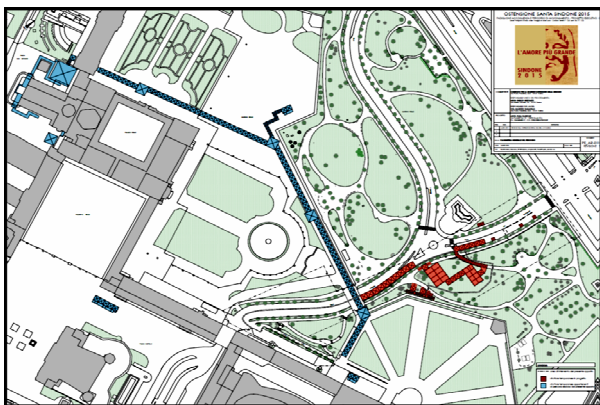
Visitor security information

The Turin law enforcement agencies welcome pilgrims and visitors

The Turin Police Department and Carabinieri, Guardia di Finanza (Revenue Guard Corps) and Corpo Forestale (Forester Corps) Command Centres, responsible for citizen security and law enforcement throughout the province of Turin, welcome visitors and pilgrims to the 2015 Holy Shroud Exposition.

In close cooperation with the organizing committee of the 2015 Holy Shroud Exposition, our agencies will guarantee all the necessary support for the pilgrimage to take place safely and peacefully, employing a remarkably high number of resources and ensuring uninterrupted and extensive presence in and around town.

The Holy Shroud is on display inside the Turin Cathedral, in the central San Giovanni Square accessible only through the entry gate at the lower Royal Gardens, Viale Partigiani nearly at the corner with Corso San Maurizio.

For any and all information concerning your own or others' security, law enforcement personnel will be on duty at mobile offices located in incoming and outgoing areas for cathedral visitors.

Law enforcement personnel will also be present in the city centre streets.

Elderly and disabled people please dial 113 for a **"domicile-collected report"**. Specially trained officers will show up at your door and receive your report.

Crime reports can also be filed with the authorities in your own country, must contain a statement on incidents and be signed by the complainant. On request, a copy of the report or a receipt for the statement provided will be issued.

For visitors and pilgrims coming from abroad **an interpreter service in Spanish, English and French** is provided 8 am / 8 pm by staff working with law enforcement.

Useful tips for visitors and pilgrims

- Avoid dark, hidden or secluded spots; choose easily accessible spots as meeting points.
- Never leave bags and objects in your car that might draw attention.
- Distrust unlicensed people offering taxi, hotel or tourist services.
- Distrust people stopping you holding cardboard, papers, little children and surrounding you with other people.
- Never leave your belongings unattended while waiting in a queue or when travelling on a crowded bus.
